LAUNCH OF THE THIRD EDITION OF ORBICOM COLLABORATIVE PROJECTS (2025-2026)



The third edition of the Collaborative Projects (2025–2026) is now officially launched.

It is open to UNESCO Chairs and all ORBICOM members who are planning or already conducting a research project that involves international comparisons or collaborations.

This new edition continues the network's ongoing efforts to promote interdisciplinary and interregional exchanges, while strengthening its role as a scientific and reflective platform in support of UNESCO's objectives in the fields of communication and information.

Among the main new features of this edition:

- Oversight by the Academic Advisory Committee (AAC), responsible for the selection, monitoring, and evaluation of projects to ensure their scientific quality;
- Implementation of a double-blind evaluation process, guaranteeing the impartiality and transparency of decisions;
- This call is also open to individuals who participated in last year's call and who believe that their project requires ongoing collaboration to achieve the desired results. It is important to note that the same project can only participate in this call for collaborative projects for two consecutive years;
- And, for the first time, there is the possibility of funding offered by ORBICOM, thanks to membership fees, subject to their effective payment. In this regard, it is very important to take note of the announcement that ORBICOM will make regarding the availability of resources in early 2026.

Selected projects will benefit from ORBICOM's collaborative framework, which promotes exchanges among Chairs, associate members, and partner institutions.

A diversity of dissemination formats (written reports, audiovisual or digital materials) is encouraged, provided that the objectives and results are clearly communicated.

STRASBOURG 2025: ORBICOM'S 13TH CONFERENCE – BETWEEN SCIENTIFIC EXCHANGE AND HUMAN CONNECTION

Organized by the [UNESCO Chair “Journalistic and Media Practices”](#) at the University of Strasbourg, ORBICOM's annual conference, held from September 29 to October 2, 2025, brought together more than 250 participants from 28 countries around the theme CIAREI: Communication, Artificial Intelligence, Remediation, Ethics, and Inclusion.



A collective reflection on the new challenges of communication

CPlenary sessions, panels, workshops, and scientific presentations followed one another at a steady pace, reflecting the diversity of approaches and the richness of the reflections shared.

The discussions brought together perspectives from all continents, fostering a critical dialogue on contemporary issues in communication, media, and the digital sphere.



A promising scientific and organizational outcome

- **International participation:** 28 countries represented, with more than 250 registered participants;
- **Scientific visibility:** all presentations, whether delivered in person or remotely, will be included in the conference proceedings;
- **Dissemination of research:** papers presented must be submitted by December 31, 2025, in accordance with the guidelines established by the track coordinators. Some works will also be featured in partner scientific journals;
- **General Assembly:** held on October 2, 2025, with strong member participation. An additional online session is scheduled for November 2025.

Beyond the academic sessions, the conference was punctuated by convivial moments that left a lasting impression.

These highlights strengthened the bonds among network members and provided a setting conducive to meaningful exchange.

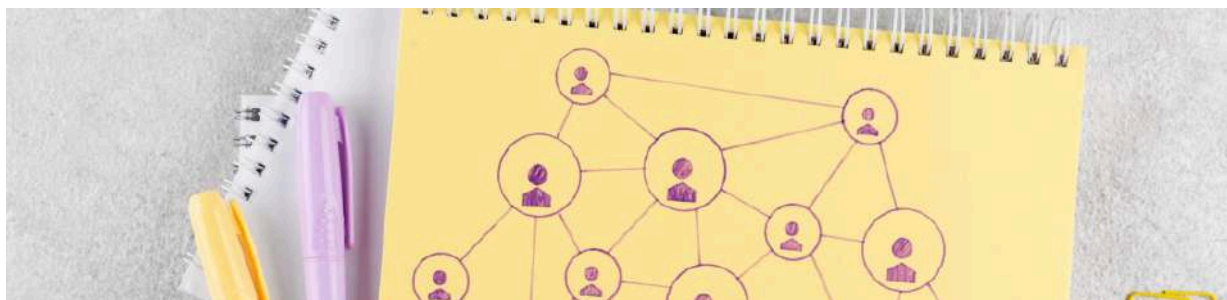

FROM MEMORY TO THE FUTURE: ORBICOM ESTABLISHES FOUR ARCHIVAL COLLECTIONS



During the summer of 2025, ORBICOM undertook a major archiving initiative aimed at preserving its history and better highlighting the contributions of those who have shaped the Network since its founding. This meticulous work of collecting, sorting, and organizing documents accumulated over the years led to the creation of four distinct archival collections, each carrying its own unique memory. Two of these collections relate directly to ORBICOM, while the other two pay tribute to individuals and initiatives that have marked its development.

One of them is a section dedicated to [Thérèse Paquet-Sévigny](#). A prominent figure in the field of communication and co-founder of the Network, Thérèse Paquet-Sévigny helped shape ORBICOM's lasting identity and direction. The documents gathered in this section provide tangible evidence of her commitment and her central role in the growth of ORBICOM.

The other collection highlights the Joint Concordia-UQAM Research Centre on Communication in the Asia-Pacific Region, initiated by former Secretary-General [Claude-Yves Charron](#). This centre played a key role in broadening ORBICOM's engagement with international issues and helped strengthen academic collaborations from a comparative and intercultural perspective. The documents compiled in this collection trace these initiatives and shed light on their contribution to the Network's development.

By establishing these collections, ORBICOM marks a key milestone in the consolidation of its institutional memory. These archives serve not only as a preservation tool but also as a valuable resource for research and education, offering insight into the evolution of communication from an international perspective.

Through this work, ORBICOM reaffirms its commitment to protecting its intangible heritage and making it accessible to its members and partners, while ensuring its transmission to future generations.

ORBICOM wishes to express its deep gratitude to Nadine Chrétien, Archivist at the Archives and Information Management Service of UQAM, for her guidance and expertise in the creation of these archival collections. Her support was essential to the success of this initiative to preserve and promote the Network's memory.

DCIRV BASED ON AI FOR EDCOMM IN ASIA AND EUROPE

Abstract :

The development and utilization of VCDLN-TVUPI products have been successful in Indonesia, Japan, and Korea through Experts from Bordeaux France. Furthermore, research from 2025 to 2026 will build a Digital Innovation Center for the Development of VCDLN Robots (DCIRV) based on Artificial Intelligence to strengthen and expand future innovation. So the focus of this research will include DCIRV Network Updates to the VCDLN Database Center and API (Application Programming Interface); Content Recommendation Chatbot and Localization. Thus, the method that will be used is the ADDIE model (Analysis, Design, Development, Implementation, and Evaluation).

Hosted in Montreal from May 21 to July 28, 2025, as part of ORBICOM's faculty mobility program, Professor Patricia Izquierdo-Iranzo (Rey Juan Carlos University, Spain) conducted extensive fieldwork on the "Maple Spring" movement, within the framework of the collaborative project "Mapping and Characterizing the Role of Social Media in 21st-Century Social Movements."

Her stay, hosted by ORBICOM's General Secretariat, made it possible to carry out 18 interviews with key actors in the movement, including participants from UQAM, Université Laval, Radio-Canada, CHOQ.ca, and the Fédération professionnelle des journalistes du Québec.

Through this study, the researcher highlights:

- the place of the Maple Spring within the continuum of global protest movements of the 2010s;
- the amplifying, though not initiating, role of social media, whose use fostered coordination, memory, and participant protection; and
- the distinctiveness of the Quebec movement, deeply rooted in a long tradition of social mobilization and student associationism.

Among the perspectives discussed, Professor Izquierdo-Iranzo proposes to continue collaboration with two researchers from UQAM and Université Laval to compare the narratives collected in Montreal with other contexts (South Africa, Lebanon, Spain), in light of current digital practices.

ONGOING PROJECTS

Under the direction of Juan Ignacio Martínez de Morentin, holder of the UNESCO Chair on Communication and Values at the University of the Basque Country (UPV/EHU), the Chair's research group is currently conducting a project titled "Design and Validation of an Instrument to Measure the Responsible and Critical Use of the Internet and Digital Devices in Primary Education (Ages 9 to 12)."

The goal is to design and validate a tool that assesses the responsible and critical use of the Internet and digital technologies among students aged 9 to 12 in the Basque Autonomous Community (CAPV).

In recent years, the UNESCO Chair has developed educational resources to support secondary school teachers in teaching media, technological, and digital literacy skills.

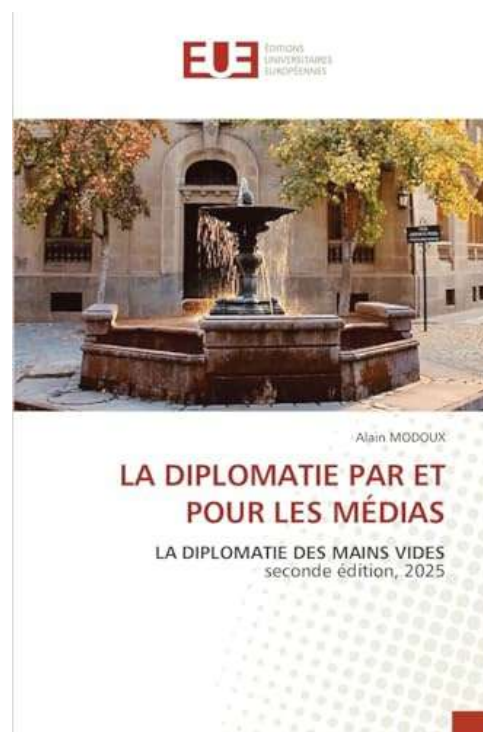

Title : *Diplomacy by and for the Media: The Diplomacy of Empty Hands*
Second Edition, 2025, Alain Modoux

The European University Editions (EUE) have released the second edition of Alain Modoux's memoirs under the title "Diplomacy by and for the Media", with the subtitle "The Diplomacy of Empty Hands" (title of the first edition). The author, a Swiss national, is a former senior international civil servant specializing in diplomatic and intercultural communication. More than 30 years of continuous commitment to press freedom and the safety of journalists have made him a "foremost authority" in international media circles, according to Seymour Topping, Professor Emeritus of International Journalism at Columbia University (USA), former Administrator of the Pulitzer Prizes and Managing Editor of The New York Times.



Alain Modoux's professional memoirs reflect both the work he carried out in the course of his various duties—first with the ICRC and later with UNESCO—and provide insight into a number of historical events he personally witnessed, which marked the last 25 years of the Cold War and the decade following the fall of the Berlin Wall on November 9, 1989. These include armed conflicts (such as the Vietnam War, the Arab-Israeli conflict, and the Biafran War), as well as dramatic but short-lived events like airplane hijackings and hostage-takings in the Middle East (for example, TWA Flight 840 hijacked to Damascus in August 1969, the hijacking of...) of three aircraft in Zarqa in September 1970,

or that of a Sabena plane in Tel Aviv in May 1972), as well as exchanges of secret agents, such as the exfiltration from Lebanon to Israel of Mossad agent Shula Cohen (code-named "The Pearl") in August 1967.

Beyond shedding light on these historical events, the author shares with readers his personal experience in dealing with major international media outlets (print, radio, and television)—first as Head of Institutional Communication for the ICRC, including his experience as a spokesperson to the international press, and later as UNESCO's representative in charge of promoting and defending media independence and freedom among Member States.

The experiences he recounts in his memoirs serve as valuable case studies for teachers, researchers, and students in international and intercultural communication, who can use them for educational or research purposes.

The 43rd session of the UNESCO General Conference will be held from October 30 to November 13, 2025, in Samarkand, Uzbekistan, marking a historic milestone for the Organization, as it will be the first time this major event takes place outside its Paris Headquarters. This event, which brings together UNESCO's 193 Member States, will define the Organization's strategic and budgetary priorities for the coming years. It also serves as a global forum for dialogue on UNESCO's key areas of focus: education, sciences, culture, communication, and information.

The discussions will address, among other topics:

- the skills needed for a sustainable future;
- the ethical and inclusive use of artificial intelligence;
- the protection of heritage in emergency situations; and
- international cooperation in science and culture.

For UNESCO, this 43rd session will also be an opportunity to strengthen the implementation of the [Pact for the future](#), adopted by the United Nations in 2024, which calls on States to rethink global governance, sustainability, and solidarity among peoples.

This event will aim to explore how societies and governments can respond to volatility in an era defined by technological disruptions, demographic transitions, and the climate crisis, by mobilizing foresight, anticipation, and futures thinking to inform policies and inspire collective action.

This year's edition will showcase the concrete application of foresight and anticipation in policy development.

It will also draw on interdisciplinary expertise, including that of the UNESCO Chairs in Futures Studies, to identify and examine emerging issues on the horizon.
